Included is a preliminary projection of grant funding for the 2021-22 school year. It is based on current information, and does not take into account new funding streams. This projection does not include any NEW grants for which the District may apply or that may be awarded between the time of this budget's development and the start of the 2021-22 school year.



Introduction

Introduction to Special Programs and Special Aid Line Item Budgets

The mission of the Department of Special Programs is to research, procure, monitor and manage supplemental funds that support and sustain school communities, providing all students with a high-quality education that prepares them to graduate as responsible, active citizens ready for success in college and careers and prepared to compete in a global economy.

The Department of Special Programs serves the District in working toward the following goals:

- to support improved achievement for all students throughout the District, and assist in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups
- to secure grant funds and supplemental resources to expand high quality programs and services for students, staff and families
- to ensure that grant funds are integrated and coordinated efficiently to support effective programs and research-based practices
- to support all departments and schools in navigating procedural requirements for program implementation and fund expenditure, and
- to ensure that all grant funds are expended in compliance with federal, state and local law, funders' requirements and District policies, and in accordance with generally accepted accounting practices.

To these ends, the Department's functions include:

- · researching and identifying potential funding opportunities
- developing and submitting grant proposals
- supporting program implementation
- monitoring grant budgets and expenditures, and
- participating in other school and District initiatives that support the SCSD Strategic Plan.

The Department of Special Programs has procured and is managing approximately \$78M in supplemental funding in the 2020-21 school year. Special aid funds are derived primarily from three sources: federal, state and local or private entities. Currently, 43% of the District's special aid funding comes from New York State; 46% from federal sources; and almost 11% from local or private agencies, organizations, foundations and partnership agreements. These grants, some of which span multi-year funding periods with various beginning and end dates, generally fall into three categories: Formula, Competitive, or Other Grant Awards.

These grants allow the District to provide important resources and services for all students, teachers and parents for programming that is critical yet cannot be wholly supported by the general fund. These services have never been more vital than they are today in the wake of a global pandemic. Grant funds complement the General Fund Budget by covering:

- the salaries and benefits of more than 529 full-time-equivalent (FTE) employees. Grant-funded staff include but are not limited to classroom teachers, instructional coaches and library media specialists, teaching assistants, administrators and administrative support personnel, psychologists, social workers, social worker assistants, guidance counselors, nurses, and adult educators;
- expenses related to State and Federal school and District reform initiatives;
- thousands of hours in additional instructional time for students, offered through extended learning time, before and after school programs, summer school and academic intervention services;

- professional development, including the salaries of professional development staff and thousands of extension of service hours for staff to participate in training opportunities;
- more than \$500,000 to support parental involvement and engagement activities, which are initiated to increase and enhance the participation of families in their children's education; and
- over \$5.8M in instructional supplies, teacher resources and technology equipment, including hundreds of electronic devices distributed to the homes of children to enable them to engage in remote learning.

The following pages, categorized as having been derived from formula, competitive and other funding sources, allow for more detailed analysis of each grant. A brief description of the grant, a breakdown of the appropriations and the prior year's allocation are provided. Also included is the amount that is projected to be available through each grant in the 2021-22 school year.

Financial Statistics

FORMULA GRANTS

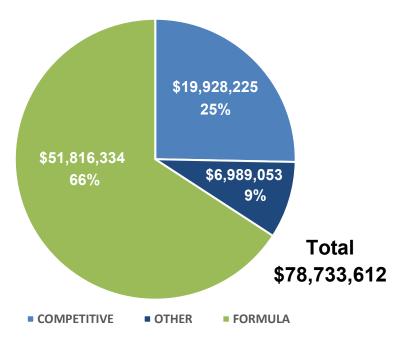
Grant allocations based on a formula established by the funder, rather than on a competitive process. Formulas and allocations, determined prior to the grant application, may be based on such factors as poverty rate, student achievement or other criteria established by the funder

COMPETITIVE GRANTS

Public or private funding earmarked for special interests established by the funder, such as academic intervention, student nutrition, after-school programming, parent programs, school reform, school safety and alternative education. The dollar amount, should it be awarded, is determined by the quality of the application in expressing the extent of need and the proposed programmatic solutions.

OTHER PROGRAMS

Includes funds from such sources as collaborative agreements with community-based organizations and institutions of higher education, flow-through funds from BOCES, tuition reimbursement, and non-competitive county/state funding or business partnerships.

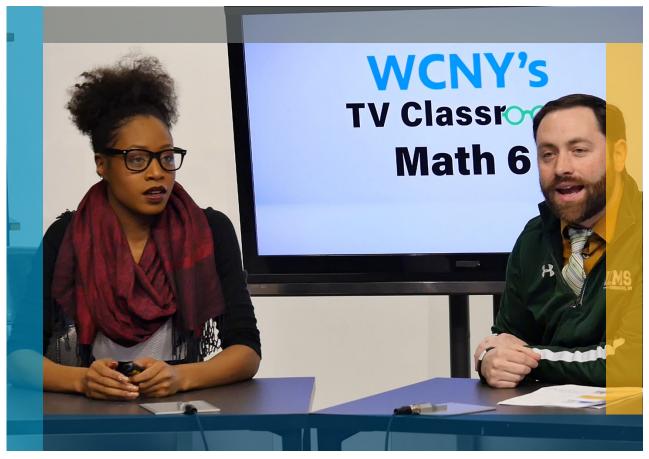

Community Schools Grant – Aid to Localities

\$3,597,057

The Community Schools Grant within Aid to Localities was awarded three years ago. This multi-year grant was designed to allow districts to support operating and capital costs associated with transforming "Struggling" (Receivership) schools into community hubs for programs and services. A significant portion of this funding was designated for the renovation of parts of Blodgett School. The New York State Education Department required that the rest be used to establish full-time community school coordinators in all targeted buildings. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the original grant end date was extended beyond its June 2020 deadline.

The District continues to build upon the community school framework. Remaining funds are being used for a broad range of initiatives, including parent and family engagement, attendance initiatives, academic enrichment through staff extension of service, mobile food pantries, and a host of other activities.

Employment Preparation Education (EPE)

The Syracuse City School District operates several adult education programs with EPE funds provided by the State Education Department, Office of Adult Education and Workforce Development. EPE programs offer adult students who are aged 21–65 the opportunity to obtain a High School Equivalency Diploma. EPE funds are also used to support adult English language learners in improving English skills while preparing for the world of work.

Courses are offered in the following instructional areas: Adult Basic Education (ABE), High School Equivalency, Pre-High School Equivalency and High School Equivalency Test Preparation, English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), Family Literacy, Workplace Training, Adult Occupational Education and other training programs when available. There is also a distance-learning program with a weekly tutoring component for adults who cannot attend regularly scheduled classes in person.

The grant allotment will also pay for program supplies, in-district travel reimbursement, professional development for program staff, and culturally relevant field trips and presentation for students.

All the schools in the District rely on Title I funds to support supplemental instruction and services.

The SCSD uses its Title I allocation to pay for afterschool academic and youth development programs, academic intervention and enrichment programming offered during the school day, professional development, parental involvement and engagement activities at the school and district level, and academic support and services for students who are homeless. Title I supports the salaries and benefits of instructional coaches, academic intervention teachers, career and technical education teachers, nationality workers, parent liaisons, school social workers, and other vital supplemental support staff. In accordance with federal regulations, equitable services are provided to eligible city-resident students who attend non-public schools in Central New York.

Title I, Part D: Neglected & Delinquent (N&D) Program

\$237,989

Title I, Part D funds are intended to improve educational services for students who reside in local and state institutions for neglected or delinquent children and youth. Although still included in the annual Consolidated Application for ESSA (Every Student Succeeds Act) Funding, this is the third year that these funds are being reported separately from the Title I, Part A grant. Title I, Part D funds are used to provide drop-out prevention programming for those students who reside in the Onondaga County Justice Center, Elmcrest Children's Center, and Toomey Residential Group Home facilities, all located within the boundaries of the city of Syracuse.

The District uses Title I, Part D funds to support supplemental instruction in core subject areas such as ELA and mathematics, as well as tutoring and counseling. This year's funding will cover the salary and benefits of a .65 FTE teacher at the Justice Center Program, 1.0 FTE teacher and 2.0 FTE Teaching Assistants at Elmcrest Children's Center, and 280 hours of after-school tutoring for the students living in the Toomey Residential Group home. Additionally, these funds will be used to purchase instructional supplies to support these three programs.

Title IV, Part A: Student Support & Academic Enrichment Program

Title IV, Part A of the 'Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)' is intended to provide all students with a high-quality education by increasing the capacity of states, local educational agencies, schools, and communities to (1) provide all students with access to a well-rounded education, (2) improve school conditions for student learning, and (3) improve the use of technology in order to improve the academic achievement and digital literacy of all students.

The District has included proposals for all three focus areas under the Title IV, Part A section of its 2020-2021 Consolidated Application for ESSA Funding. Addressing the need to ensure well-rounded educational opportunities, Title IV funds will pay for hourly extension of service for teachers to provide afterschool academic support in such content areas as STEM, arts and music, as well as the purchase of online professional development and digital student resources. Title IV funds will also be used to improve school conditions (school climate) by continuing a contract to provide support and resources to schools. Finally, Title IV funds will be used to ensure effective use of technology by continuing a technical assistance and consulting contract, and by purchasing hardware, software, and site licenses for eBooks and other digital content for teacher professional development and student use.

Universal Pre-K (UPK) \$12,939,244

The primary purpose of the Universal Prekindergarten (UPK) program is to provide three and four year old students with an opportunity to access high-quality prekindergarten programs that will provide the foundation to help prepare them for future school success. Starting in the 2019-20 school year the State Education Department merged several prekindergarten programs together, combining the UPK Program with Extended Prekindergarten 1 and 2 (EPK and EPK2), and Extended Prekindergarten for Three-Year Old Children (3PK).

This year, the Syracuse City School District's PreK programs will serve: 264 3 year old children in half-day programs; 371 3 year olds in full-day programs; 358 4 year olds in half-day programs; and 968 4 year olds in full-day programs. Most of these students will be served directly by the Syracuse City School District. The others will enroll in programs offered by day care centers, nursery schools and Head Start programs, collectively referred to as Approved Special Education Providers (ASEPs).

The UPK Program budget includes the salaries and benefits of teachers, teaching assistants and support staff, contracts with vendors and external providers, site rental, field trips and program supplies. The portion of the budget not covered under the NYSED's allocation is supported by the general fund.

Competitive Grants

21st Century Community Learning Centers (2017-22)

\$1,200,000

This program supports the creation of community learning centers that provide academic enrichment opportunities during non-school hours for children, particularly students who attend high-poverty and low-performing schools. The program helps students meet state and local student standards in core academic subjects, offers students a broad array of enrichment activities that can complement their regular academic programs, and offers literacy and other educational services to the families of participating children.

In this fourth year of the five-year 21st CCLC grant, Westcott Community Center again serves as the community-based partner at Ed Smith and Huntington K-8 Schools, while YMCA of Greater Syracuse serves as the partner at Roberts K-8 School. Under regular circumstances, the school-based centers are expected to be open an average of 15 additional hours per week, providing academics, enrichments and youth development programming before and after school for a minimum of 790 students. Family activities and event sessions focus on literacy and career skills and provide another opportunity for families to be more meaningfully involved in their children's education.

The program follows the 21st CCLC framework and evaluation plan, incorporating acceleration and intervention academic classes along with interest-based enrichment and youth development programming in such areas as dance, leadership training, visual and performing arts, and cooking. District teachers and teaching assistants provide curriculum-aligned academic support and our community-based partners serve as the programs' enrichment providers.

ESAS Program grant funds support the salary and benefits of two school recreation supervisors, and extension of service hours with associated benefits of part-time program liaisons, lead teachers in each targeted school, afterschool academic and enrichment teachers, food service helpers (for dinner/snacks), and clerical staff. The grant also covers contractual services with the schools' required community-based partners (The Red House Art Center, YMCA of Greater Syracuse and Westcott Community Center) to provide enrichment staff and support, as well as supplies for program enhancement, student travel for educational field experiences, and indirect (administrative) costs.

Extended School Day/School Violence Prevention (SVP) at Meachem

The Syracuse City School District (SCSD) is in the final year of a five-year grant to provide an Extended School Day/School Violence Prevention (ESD/SVP) Program at Meachem Elementary School. Partnering with Catholic Charities of Onondaga County and various school violence prevention vendors, the District is poised to provide ESD/SVP after-school programming for a minimum of 225 students during the school year. Syracuse City School District teachers and teaching assistants will provide academic support with Catholic Charities serving as the program's enrichment partner, providing high-quality, interest-based enrichment and youth development programming. Other community partners will provide services related to school violence prevention through student assemblies during the afterschool program.

ESD/SVP grant funds will continue to support hourly extension of service for SCSD teachers, teaching assistants and other certified and support staff to provide programming and support outside of the regular school day and extension of service for a behavior support specialist to extend hours of the Behavior Intervention Center into the afterschool program. The grant also covers half the salary and benefits of a Program Supervisor. In addition, the budget covers contractual costs for enrichment and school violence prevention partners, contractual costs with an external evaluator to provide program feedback pertaining to project goals and objectives, supplies and materials to support afterschool academic and SVP activities, and travel costs associated with educational field experiences and mandatory staff attendance at the ESD/SVP Conference in Albany.

Homeless Child Education (McKinney-Vento)

The purpose of the McKinney-Vento Grant is to facilitate the improved attendance, engagement, and academic success of children and youth who are homeless or living in temporary housing. The District uses these funds to continue its contract with Coordinated Care Services, Inc. (CCSI). CCSI reviews targeted students' Behavior, Attendance and Grade (BAG) data in conjunction with anecdotal information from school staff and families, assists schools in determining the level and extent of need, helps to identify appropriate universal, targeted and/or intensive interventions and supports for identified students, links and/or refers students and their families to school-based and community resources, programs, services and supports, facilitates the implementation of Oasis Book Clubs in schools, promotes student and family voice and choice, and monitors student progress, particularly with regard to attendance, engagement and academic performance. The budget allocates funds for the contract with CCSI, for book club materials, and for the McKinney-Vento Liaison to attend mandatory state-level meetings in Albany, NY.

Learning Technology Grant

\$199,363

The purpose of the Learning Technology Grant (LTG) is to develop, implement, and share innovative programs that utilize learning technologies to personalize learning and/or increase access to high-quality, rigorous learning experiences (e.g., online, distance, or blended learning). The Learning Technology Grant also supports professional development programs to assist teachers and educational leaders in effectively utilizing learning technology to enhance teaching and learning. These programs focus on improving culturally and linguistically responsive learning environments. Learning Technology Grants support the mission of the NYS Board of Regents, which is to ensure that every child has equitable access to the highest quality educational opportunities, services and supports in schools that provide effective instruction aligned to the state's standards, as well as positive learning environments so that each child is prepared for success in college, career and citizenship.

Third year funds are used to support the purchase of laptops, iPads and audio and visual technology and software, and travel costs to attend required post-pandemic LTG meetings in Albany, NY. The grant also pays for hourly extension of service and employee benefits for instructional staff to work on design teams that continue to focus on creating online blended credit recovery courses, developing ePortfolio standards/requirements for grades K-12 and participating in related professional development. The private schools located in the Syracuse City School District's geographical boundaries are also invited to participate in design and professional development sessions and sharing in the technology resources. Additionally, the budget includes extension of service for a senior analyst from the District's Office of Shared Accountability to evaluate and report on the success of the programs.

The purpose of the McKinney-Vento Act is to facilitate the improved attendance, engagement, and academic success of children and youth who are homeless or living in temporary housing. The Enhanced Grant for Trauma-Sensitive Schools supports school districts in their efforts to take very deliberate steps toward creating and implementing trauma-sensitive programs.

The District uses these funds for representatives from every School Climate and Discipline Team to build upon the foundational concepts covered in Trauma Informed Practices for Educators (TIPE) training to become TIPE Champions in each school. The TIPE Champions engage in learning about evidence-based strategies and resources that will be integrated into teaching strategies and turn-keyed in each school. This will enable schools to make data driven program decisions and measure change that occurs because of selected interventions. Additionally, schools will explore strategies from the "Domains of Trauma Informed Practices" and other strategies validated and endorsed by the National Child Traumatic Stress Institute.

Grant funds will cover extension of service for representatives of each school's Climate and Discipline Teams to participate in Level Two Turn-Key Training for Targeted Implementation Professional development; and travel costs for the District leaders to attend a required grantee meeting in Albany, NY.

Mentor Teacher Internship Program (MTIP)

The Mentor Teacher Internship Program (MTIP) was initiated in 2002 to provide mentoring and support for new teachers. MTIP is a collaborative effort among the Syracuse City School District Office of Human Resources, Office of Teaching & Learning, the Syracuse Teachers Association and the Syracuse Teacher Center. Under MTIP, beginning teachers receive a full year of mentoring by experienced teachers.

The grant pays for a portion of the MTIP Facilitator's salary and benefits. During the 2020-21 school year, 30 mentors are providing ongoing support and mentoring to approximately 40 beginning teachers.

Model P-20 Principal Prep

\$425,529

The Syracuse City School District(SCSD) has been awarded a second round of funding for the Model P-20 Partnership for Principal Preparation Grant. Working collaboratively with Syracuse University and Insight Education Group, the District is engaging a second cohort of up to fifteen aspiring building leaders in a unique preparation program that will enable them to emerge better equipped to take on the challenges of leading high-need schools toward achievement of improved outcomes for all students. This competency-based model program is designed to provide the candidates with an individualized approach to learning, tailoring the course sequence, format and content to each candidate's strengths and weaknesses. Candidates will receive high-quality coaching and will be paired with an experienced building leader mentor for ongoing guidance. The ultimate vision of the P-20 Partnership is to spur and support a growing statewide network of partnership programs that share the aim of improving principal preparation, enhancing staff and school performance, and contributing to improved student academic success. The SCSD P-20 Program may be used as a statewide model.

Grant funds are allocated for a full-time Program Manager tasked with developing and implementing a comprehensive recruitment strategy, matching aspiring leaders with mentors, and providing dedicated leadership coaching and development. It will also cover stipends for veteran instructional leaders to mentor program participants and extension of service for leadership-based professional development for program participants. Contractual costs are budgeted for Syracuse University to cover tuition and fees and for Insight Education to provide professional development and support. Finally, this grant pays for supplies and books, computers and other required materials, in-state travel to meetings and/or conferences, and indirect costs.

The Syracuse City School District (SCSD) is implementing the Syracuse Employment And School Opportunity Network (SEASON) program for a targeted group of 40 high school students who are overaged, under-credited and at significant risk of dropping out. Utilizing a blended work readiness and academic model, the SEASON program provides targeted students with the opportunity to complete their high school requirements while earning money through paid internships or work experiences. Each week, students are onsite for academics and offsite to participate in work-based learning and paid internships each day. The academic program is provided by certified SCSD teachers who incorporate technical skills, career readiness practices, life skills and financial literacy into instructional blocks. The District has contracted with CNY Works for their expertise in providing workforce readiness and skills assessment and monitoring and coordination of placements and payments for program youth participating in paid internships/job experiences.

Grant funds are used to support: the part-time salary and benefits of a teacher to serve as Program Facilitator/Retention Specialist; hourly extension of service for the Retention Specialist to provide program support and management during the summer months; purchased services with CNY Works, Inc. to provide case management, screening, enrollment, and facilitation of financial literacy, work readiness and paid internships/job experiences; busing costs to enable participating students to access career exploration opportunities and paid internships/work experiences; program supplies; and testing materials.

Opportunity Youth Career Exploration & Access Grant (OYCEA) CNY Works \$150,000

CNY Works, working in partnership with the Syracuse City School District (SCSD), was awarded an OYCEA grant from the NYS Department of Labor. The Syracuse Employment And School Opportunity Network (SEASON) program was designed to complement the District's grant awarded under the same competition. CNY Works is subcontracting with SCSD to provide academic support for the SEASON program, which targets a group of 30 high school students who are significantly behind in basic skills and in meeting high school graduation requirements. Utilizing a blended work readiness and academic model, the SEASON program provides students who are at high risk of dropping out of school with the opportunity to complete their high school requirements while earning money through paid internship or work experiences.

Students are offsite for a portion of the program to participate in job shadowing, career coaching and exploration, resume writing, and paid internships, and then onsite at the Johnson Vocational Center for academic classes. The academic program is provided by certified SCSD teachers who incorporate technical skills, career readiness practices, life skills and financial literacy into instructional blocks. Additionally, the District supplies transportation to worksites and field experiences.

Grant funds support the cost of a Program Facilitator/Retention Specialist to provide daily oversight and monitoring of program implementation, hourly extension of service for student support in the form of a summer bridge program, tutoring, and regents prep; program supplies, and student transportation.

Pathways in Technology (P-TECH) - Early College High School at Henninger \$625,000

The Syracuse City School District has been awarded its sixth year of funding to continue the implementation of Henninger High School's P-TECH Health Careers Academy, an innovative collaboration with Onondaga Community College (OCC), SUNY Broome Community College, St. Joseph's Hospital Health Center, SUNY Upstate Medical University, Laboratory Alliance of Central New York, Crouse Hospital, and the Syracuse Community Health Center. This P-TECH program offers a six-year integrated high school and college curriculum for grades 9-14 that focuses on medical career pathways and the acquisition of essential workplace skills. P-TECH students graduate with a NYS Regents Diploma with a technical endorsement, industry-approved credentials, and a no-cost-to-student Associates Degree in Health Information Technology/Medical Records or Clinical Laboratory Technology. Furthermore, successful graduates will be given first-in-line consideration for open career positions at partnering hospitals, clinics, labs and doctors' offices.

Year 6 grant funds support the following: continuation of a full-time Clinical Laboratory Technician/ CTE teacher, partial salary for a Health Information Technology teacher, and partial salary for a P-TECH/ Work-Based Learning Coordinator; hourly extension of service for teachers to participate in planning, curriculum development, and professional development; hourly extension for teachers to provide student supports as well as a virtual summer bridge program; hourly extension of service for a retired teacher to serve as the College Transition Specialist in providing school- and campus-based support to students enrolled in on-campus courses; contractual costs with partnering institutions of higher education for tuition, student fees and project support; contractual costs with MACNY/PEB for the recruitment and provision of career mentors/coaches for participating P-TECH students and the planning and coordination of work-based learning activities; contractual costs for billboard and radio advertising; laptop computers; college textbooks; roundtrip student bus passes; and busing costs to allow for students to participate in career exploration activities and work-based learning opportunities, and to attend classes at OCC.

These funds are used to support the following: salary and benefits of a half-time P-TECH/Work-Based Learning Coordinator to oversee the implementation and monitoring of grant activities; salary and benefits of a full-time Electronics Technology Instructor; hourly extension of service for ITC instructional staff to participate in professional development, project planning, and program monitoring, and to provide supplemental academic support and virtual summer bridge programming; hourly extension of service for a retired teacher to serve as the College Transition Specialist in providing school and campus based support to students enrolled in on-campus courses; contractual costs to partner with the Manufacturer's Association of Central New York (MACNY) to coordinate and provide dedicated P-TECH industry liaisons and industry mentors/career coaches for students; contractual costs to partner with OCC to provide a dedicated college liaison; payment to OCC for tuition and fees related to students attending on-campus classes; busing costs to allow for students to participate in career exploration activities and work-based learning opportunities, and to attend classes at OCC; and instructional supplies to support the ELT and MLT pathways.

The Syracuse City School District has been awarded a fourth year of funding to continue this innovative collaboration with Onondaga Community College (OCC), Mohawk Valley Community College (MVCC), CenterState CEO, and the Manufacturers Association of Central New York (MACNY). This P-TECH program offers a six-year integrated high school and college curriculum for grades 9-14 that focuses on computer information systems (CIS) and remotely piloted aircraft systems (RPAS) pathways. P-TECH students will graduate with a NYS Regents Diploma with a technical endorsement, industry-approved credentials, and a no-cost-to-student Associate of Applied Science (AAS) Degree in either Computer Information Systems (CIS) from OCC or Remotely Piloted Aircraft Systems (RPAS) from MVCC. They will be prepared for immediate employment in positions requiring CIS and RPAS training, skills and licensure. Furthermore, successful graduates will receive first in line consideration for open positions at member businesses of CenterState and MACNY.

The fourth year budget supports the following: salary and benefits of a full-time Computer Information Systems CTE teacher and a .65 FTE P-TECH/Work-Based Learning Coordinator; hourly extension of service for teachers to participate in planning, curriculum development, and professional development and to provide summer bridge and student supports; hourly extension of service for a retired teacher to serve as the College Transition Specialist in providing school and campus based support to students enrolled in on-campus courses; contractual costs with partnering institutions of higher education for tuition, student fees and project support; contractual costs with Partners for Education and Business for the recruitment and assignment of career mentors/coaches for participating P-TECH students; supplies and materials to support the CIS and RPAS pathways; roundtrip bus passes for participating students; and busing costs to allow for students to participate in career exploration activities, work-based learning opportunities, and to attend college classes.

School Climate Transformation Grant

\$991,845

The Syracuse City School District received a competitive School Climate Transformation grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The overall purpose of this five year grant is to develop, enhance, or expand resources and technical assistance for schools implementing a multi-tiered system of support (MTSS) for improving school climate. This funding is for evidence based efforts that are designed to foster safety, to promote supportive academic, disciplinary, and physical environments, and/or to encourage and maintain respectful, trusting, and caring relationships throughout the school community. It is also designed to be used to implement opioid abuse prevention and mitigation strategies.

In the project's second year, School Climate Transformation Grant funds are allocated to play an integral role in supporting, refining and establishing Oasis and Promising Futures Leadership Academy as models for culturally responsive, trauma-sensitive, and student-centered teaching and learning. In subsequent years, these schools will serve as demonstration sites for high quality professional development on factors related to positive school climate. The project also focuses on collection and analysis of qualitative and quantitative school and District climate data for refining and enhancing multi-tiered systems of support throughout the District.

Grant funds support the following: the salary and benefits of a full-time Project Facilitator, Data Analyst and Climate Coach, extension of service for professional development, staff travel to required meetings and conferences, supplies for two family resource centers, contractual charges with a community based organization for substance abuse counseling, expert consulting and training, and external evaluation services.

Smart Scholars - Early College High School (ECHS) at ITC

\$200,000

Through the Early College High School (ECHS) initiative at ITC, traditionally underrepresented and economically disadvantaged students will earn at least 24 college credits and/or an associate degree in Math and Science by the time they graduate from high school. This innovative program combines high school and college in a rigorous, supportive environment that empowers an annual cohort of 32 students who enter the program in 9th grade, enabling them to graduate within four years, career-ready and with a significant head start on credits for postsecondary success. The initial cohort that started two years ago is currently in 11th grade.

The Syracuse City School District is partnering with institutions of higher education (IHEs) on this initiative. The ECHS curriculum is jointly developed by the District and the IHEs within the context of a cohort-based small learning community within the high school, where students make discoveries in a project-based learning environment and are taught using state-of-the-art instructional technologies. The instructors for the ECHS college-level courses will be select certified District teachers who are accredited as adjunct faculty, along with IHE faculty delivering classes on campus.

Expenses to be covered include teachers' extension of service for meetings, curriculum development and recruitment activities, and a 2 week summer bridge program for incoming freshmen. The budget also covers contractual costs with IHEs for their participation in planning and curriculum development, and for student recruitment. Additionally, this grant pays for teacher extensions for supplemental tutoring and student support, for an on-campus summer college orientation program for next year's rising 11th graders, and for tuition and books for high school students taking classes on campus.

Smart Scholars - Early College High School (ECHS) at ITC - Cohort 3

\$190,000

The Syracuse City School District secured \$190,000 from the New York State Education Department to continue implementation of the Smart Scholars Early College High School Program at ITC. In the fourth year of this five year grant, ITC continues its partnership with SUNY Onondaga Community College (OCC) and SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry (ESF) to develop and provide comprehensive and coordinated services that will improve the provision, quality and accessibility of college-level courses and experiences for ITC students. Approximately 27 students are attending college classes on the OCC campus in the 2020-21 school year.

The overarching goal of the project is to provide ITC students with an accelerated program of study that allows them to complete a high school diploma while earning a minimum of 24 college credits. Grant funds are used to support the following: hourly extension of service for a retired teacher to serve as the College Transition Specialist in providing school and campus based support to students enrolled in college level courses; teachers' extension of service to participate in ongoing staff development and meetings, and to provide supplemental learning opportunities for students, including summer bridge programming and tutoring, intensive Regents prep sessions, and credit recovery opportunities; extension of service for a typist II to provide clerical support to the program; purchased services with OCC for tuition and grant-related services and participation; purchased services with WebAssign for student access to online ESF college textbooks and course content; busing costs for students to travel to OCC and ESF campuses to participate in college and career exploration activities and lab experiences; purchase of laptop computers for student use; and employee benefits.

Smart Scholars – Early College High School (ECHS) at Nottingham

\$82,547

Nottingham High School is in the tenth year of funding through the Smart Scholars Early College High School (ECHS) grant. The goals of this program are to increase the high school graduation rates of Nottingham students and to increase the number of these students who complete a postsecondary degree. The Nottingham School Leadership Team, the Smart Scholars Steering Committee and the higher education partners (SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry (ESF) and Syracuse University Project Advance) have continued to collaboratively plan strategies and develop activities designed to achieve these goals.

The curriculum has been designed, implemented and sequenced such that students in the program are able to earn up to 24 college credit hours by the time they graduate from high school. For the most part, college credits are issued by ESF and Syracuse University, and are articulated seamlessly between these institutions. Furthermore, credits are transferable to other SUNY or CUNY institutions of higher education (IHEs), consistent with State University of New York policy. This year's funds are used to support teachers' extension of service to participate in joint professional development with IHE faculty and to provide student support after school and over the summer. Teachers of Tomorrow \$540,000

The Syracuse City School District has secured funding for continuation of the Teachers of Tomorrow program. The Teachers of Tomorrow grant, comprised of several sub-programs, is designed to attract, advance and retain qualified teachers in Syracuse City Schools. The Summer in the City Program provides stipends to teaching assistants and/or pre-certified teachers who participate in field placement opportunities during July and August. The Recruitment Incentive Program provides stipends for first year teachers working in underperforming schools or in teacher shortage areas. There are two Tuition Reimbursement Programs: one designed to reimburse non-certified teachers for costs associated with taking approved courses toward permanent certification, and the other for certified teachers working toward additional certification in science, math or bilingual education. Finally, the District's nationally certified master teachers are eligible to receive Teachers of Tomorrow's NYS Master Teacher stipends.

This grant is designed to alleviate the shortage of teachers in the subject areas of science, mathematics, bilingual education, and English as a New Language. Eligible teachers are reimbursed for tuition and related expenses incurred in obtaining: a) professional certification in Science, Mathematics, or English to Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL); b) initial certification in Science, Mathematics, and ESOL; or c) the Bilingual Education Extension.

All eligible District teachers are encouraged to apply for reimbursement of expenses through the TOT:SMB/ELL program, and up to 24 awards will be provided on a first-come-first-served basis. Each recipient is required to teach science, mathematics, bilingual education or ESOL/ENL for at least one year in a low-performing Syracuse City School.

Therapeutic Crisis Intervention – Cornell University

\$65,077

The Syracuse City School District (SCSD) has collaborated with Cornell University in submitting a competitive application to the National Science Foundation. Cornell, serving as the lead applicant, was successful in securing this funding on behalf of SCSD to implement Therapeutic Crisis Intervention for Schools (TCI-S) in all elementary and K-8 schools districtwide. TCI-S is a trauma informed program that provides school staff with safe, effective and trauma sensitive skills to manage the emotional and behavioral challenges they encounter in their daily interactions with students. Cornell University will, in turn, evaluate the impact of TCI-S, determining mechanisms through which it influences staff and student outcomes, and identifying factors that affect the implementation and outcomes of TCI-S. Through the project, it is anticipated that 1,500 staff members will ultimately have participated in training, which will benefit 12,000 students each year.

The District has used its portion of the grant to provide intensive professional development for a cohort of turn-key trainers. They then provide training, coaching, technical assistance and support to administrators, teachers, teaching assistants and sentries in every elementary and K-8 school.

Title I: NYSIP PLC Grant \$1,200,000

The NYSIP-PLC program was established to increase student achievement in New York State Title I Schools, particularly those schools identified for improvement, by encouraging greater racial/ethnic, special education, English language learner/multilingual learner (ELL/MLL), and socioeconomic integration. This program consists of three phases. Phase I was to learn about the benefits of integration and develop a sustainable integration strategy for the district. Phase II was to refine the integration strategy and implement a limited pilot. Phase III is intended for districts to implement more fully the integration plans developed through participating in Phases I and II.

The integration strategy developed by the District is to provide highly desirable, well-developed choice programs for all of our traditional (grades 6-8) middle schools to attract a larger population of students and families from diverse demographic backgrounds. With this, the District expects that the demographic makeup of the District's traditional middle schools will more closely match the 6th-8th grade populations in the District's PreK-8 schools. Phase III of the project focuses on enhancing the Middle Years International Baccalaureate (MYIB) program at Clary and the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) program at Lincoln. This grant pays for contracts, membership and training fees with MYIB and AVID. It also covers the salaries and benefits of full-time AVID and MYIB Coaches at Lincoln and Clary respectively, as well as teachers' extension of service to participate in professional development, planning and data review, extension of service supplemental instruction and for a data analyst to review and assess student choice and attendance patterns. The budget also covers travel costs for the Implementation Team's attendance at statewide NYSIP-PLC sessions.

WIOA Title II - BOCES \$82,095

The Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act (WIOA) provides adult education and literacy services to assist out-of-school youth and adults to become literate and obtain the knowledge and skills necessary for employment and economic self-sufficiency, and to assist these individuals in the completion of a secondary school education. Specifically, Program Area 1 provides funding for Adult Basic Education (ABE) and Literacy Services.

Adults living in and near poverty often are hampered by lack of skills and education, leading to limited wages and job opportunities. The WIOA ABE grant addresses the low literacy skills, lack of a high school diploma, and lack of career awareness and employability training among adults in Central New York. The District and OCM BOCES conduct Adult Basic Education and Adult Secondary Education (ABE/ASE) classes, Distance Learning and National External Diploma Program (NEDP) programs, through which students may improve literacy skills, earn a High School Equivalency diploma, and pursue career options, post-secondary education, and employment. The Syracuse City School District has approximately 300 students under the age of 21enrolled in ABE/ASE programming, while 251 of OCM BOCES' students are between the ages of 16 and 24. There is a dire need in Onondaga County to educate this population and WIOA funding is critical to this mission.

The budget pays for the salaries and employee benefits of one teacher, testing and other supplies and materials, and a contract with OCM BOCES for instructional services to program participants.

The Syracuse City School District (SCSD)has expanded the planned Syracuse Employment and School Opportunity Network (SEASON) program to an additional targeted group of 40 high school students who are over-aged, under-credited and at significant risk of dropping out. Utilizing a blended work readiness and academic model, the SEASON program provides targeted students with the opportunity to complete their high school requirements while earning money and building skills through paid internships and work experiences. Students are onsite for the academic portion of the program, and also participate offsite in work-based learning and paid internships. The academic program is provided by certified SCSD teachers who incorporate technical skills, career readiness, life skills and financial literacy training. The District contracts with CNY Works for their expertise in providing workforce readiness and skills assessment and monitoring, coordination of work placements, and payments to youth participating in paid internships/job experiences. The District receives a mandatory cash match in the amount of \$25,000 from the Allyn Foundation.

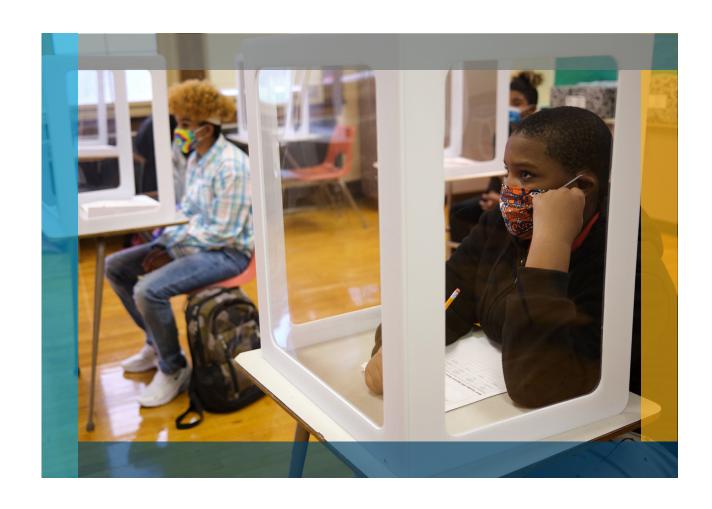

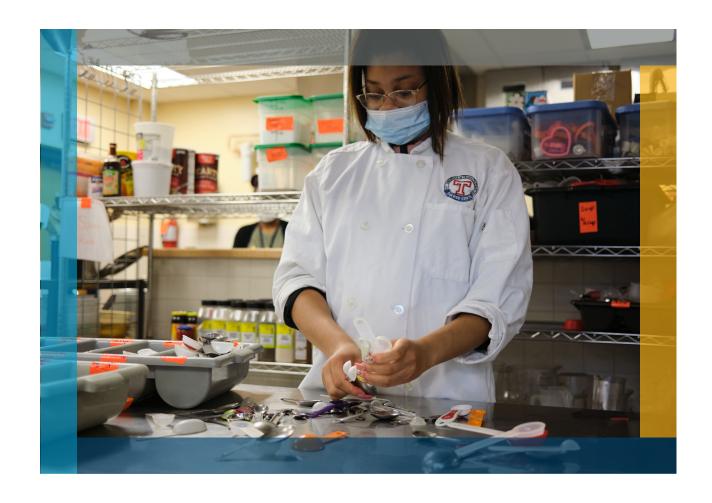
