Message from Director Jacqueline LeRoy

Dear ENL, World Language and Bilingual Education teachers,

Despite the winter weather and a major Nor'easter storm the day before our much-anticipated March Symposium, we had only a few vendor cancellations with more than 200 SCSD participants who braved the many inches of snow to attend the event. In addition to having two very well-known national experts in the field of language learning present, our department teachers shared their expertise, talents and perspectives on a variety of topics that focused on language learning and promoting multilingualism. It is with much pride that I say, a sincere thank you to our many department members who made our first symposium an exciting and successful opportunity for all educators who value and promote language learning.

As we move into springtime, we now have the opportunity to gauge how our students are acquiring the new language (L2) with the administration of LAS Links, the NYSESLAT and LOTE Checkpoint A and Checkpoint B assessments. LAS Links is completed by April 20th, the speaking components for the NYSESLAT begins April 9th and the LOTE Speaking component begins May 1st. The Speaking assessment is a one-to-one administration with the other modalities tested on designated test dates determined by the New York State Education Department.

As language specialists, we know that some of our students may be anxious about the Speaking test and how they will be evaluated on speaking in L2. Preparing them in advance by familiarizing them with the expectations may help to lower their level of anxiety. In addition, providing a physical space for administering the Speaking component that is conducive to a testing environment and in a location separate from other students may help them to do their best.

It is always important to take a moment to celebrate our department teachers and students and I invite you to take a look at our celebrations page and read about what's happening in our department. Please continue to submit your celebrations so we can highlight them!

Dr. Kate Menken



Kate Menken, a Professor of Linguistics at Queens College of the City University of New York (CUNY), and a Research Fellow at the Research Institute for the Study of Language in an Urban Society of the CUNY Graduate Center, spoke at the March Symposium on March 3, 2018. Her presentation showed that decisions about whether schools will adopt monolingual or multilingual approaches are typically ideological rather than research-based. The presentation explored this tension, and highlighted the recent expansion of dual language bilingual education, driven by families and communities seeking opportunities for all children to be multilingual. The presentation offered recommendations to harness this growing interest in bilingual education in ways that hold true to its original social justice aims.

Personalized Learning Through the Lens of Dual Language

At both the SCSD March Symposium and the 2018 NYSABE Conference Seymour Dual Language educators Lillian Zayas, Ilianatcha Rosa and Gloria Kimmich presented on the topic of personalized learning through the lens of dual language. This session details a co-teaching model used in a kindergarten Spanish/English dual language setting. This co-teaching model allows students to enhance their learning by becoming biliterate, bilingual and bi-cultural. The session focuses on how teachers can co-plan and implement theme based lessons using the common core standards, as well as adaptive instructional materials and strategies that help increase oral language.

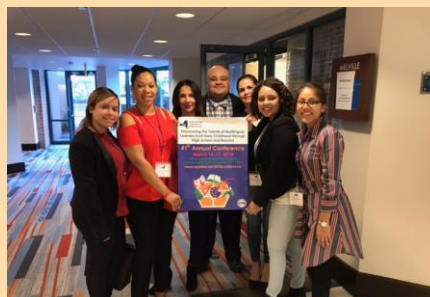

Topics to be discussed include:

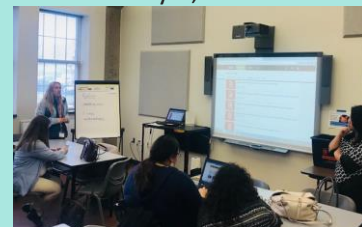
- ACTFL Core Proficiency Practices and Standards

Checkpoint A and B LOTE Formal Speaking Assessment

Administration of the 8th grade Level 1 and high school Level 3 LOTE Formal Speaking Assessment is from May 1st - May 31st.

All LOTE Teachers will receive the Formal Speaking Guides, the Sourcebooks and the Reporting Sheets electronically prior to the administration date. At the completion of the Speaking component, teachers submit **Part 1 of the Formal Speaking Test Reporting Sheet, completed in ink, to the principal** for a signature and then to be secured. The Reporting Sheets are later submitted to the Scoring Center with the Level 1 and Level 3 exams, Parts 2, 3, and 4, after administration on June 18th.
