#### **Students Participate in Syracuse Soapbox Derby**

Students from **Danforth** and **Huntington** joined forces to race in the annual Soapbox Derby. In the spring, students started building

their derby car using trial and error and knowledge they acquired through STEM classes. First place Stock Driver Florance Irankunda (Huntington) and first place Super Stock Driver Yussuf Abdullahi (Danforth) qualified to complete in the World Championship Race in Akron, Ohio in July, and several other students were recognized with awards.



#### Dr. King Students Learn Financial Literacy through **Danny Dollar Academy**

Dr. King students in third through fifth grade learned about financial literacy thanks to Ty Allan Jackson and the Danny Dollar Academy. Students read a children's book called Danny Dollar Millionaire Extraordinaire, which taught them about the basics of finance, entrepreneurship and economics. They worked with their classmates to come up with their own business pursuits based on the principles they learned about, including credit, debt, banking, interest, marketing and more. One class made and sold slime, generating a \$76 profit; another sold lemonade, making more than \$140; others made cookies, pizza, hosted a car wash and more.



"You have to be responsible to meet your goals," one fifth grader explained. "No one becomes a millionaire overnight... you have to work hard!"

Students also learned the importance of giving back, and several classes said the money they raised will be donated to local charities. Great work, Dr. King scholars!

In one of her daily homeroom restorative circles, a Clary 8th grader shared the news that her cousin had been killed. She was distraught, and her classmates wondered what they could do to help. The class brainstormed and came up with many ideas, eventually settling

"I've seen a lot of violence where I live," Zaniya Bell said. "It's sad. But



## **Roberts Students Start Circle of Giving**

**Roberts Student Council and WEB leaders** recently led a school-wide collection for Griffin's Guardians, a local organization that funds research for and offers support to children undergoing treatment for pediatric cancer.



Their slogan was "a little change can make a world of difference," and the student leaders encouraged their peers to contribute in a gradelevel contest. At the end of a three-week period, the school collectively raised more than \$752!

"We didn't think students would be as interested as they were," Leah Nowak added. "But because the winning grade earned an incentive, this was kind of a situation where you feel good about giving your money, because you are benefitting your class, but you're also benefitting others who need it. We didn't really realize how much our pennies would add up!"

To keep the chain of kindness going, upon finishing their three-week fundraiser, the **Roberts** students challenged their friends at ELMS to continue the effort. ELMS students accepted the challenge and raised \$435 through their own effort... and they continued the goodwill by challenging Grant Middle School to join in!

#### SCSD Students Make a **Difference through Youth** Advisory Council

As part of the Syracuse Youth Advisory Council (SYAC), 15 SCSD students representing Corcoran, Nottingham, ITC and PSLA at Fowler - students met at City Hall biweekly to discuss issues facing students in the City and their proposed solutions.

The two issues they chose to focus on with their advocacy: adding water bottle filling stations to the list of school improvements during building construction, and increasing the diversity of teachers in the district's Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs.

"I wanted to be part of a bigger change and help make the City of Syracuse a better place through my leadership," Corcoran sophomore Saima Nezami said. "Because of this process, I understand more about the government and political systems. This has given me the skills to be more involved and continue furthering myself in the future."



To conclude their service on the Youth Advisory Council, students presented their findings to the Syracuse Common Council as part of the SYAC Annual Assembly, where they also made recommendations for improvement and noted what they believe they can do to help improve Syracuse.

#### **Corcoran Students Create Artwork for Children in Syria**

Imagine being a child, living in a refugee camp in Syria.

That's what six Corcoran National Art Honor Society students did, when art teacher Jeanette Capria-Lazzaro asked for volunteers to create drawings - on their own time - for The Memory Project, a nonprofit organization that provides portraits as gifts for children around the world who are facing challenges.

"Art is a very expressive form of communication," junior Mark **Lissovenko** said. "The fact that our drawings were sent to an impoverished country, where kids don't get much exposure to art, really opens their world. I wanted to be part of that and to help make even just a small difference."

Staff from The Memory Project sent Corcoran students photographs of children in poverty in Syria. The students had two months to create their drawings before they were sent back to be distributed. We're proud of these Corcoran artists for sharing their talents to bring happiness to others!
