PSLA Student Selected to Play for US National Amputee Soccer Team

Musabwa Nzirimwo started playing soccer in Africa in 2014. In 2015, he came to America, where he joined the Tillie's Touch recreational league as well as the JV team at PSLA at Fowler.

"I like that it requires teamwork, and it keeps me motivated," Musa explained. "Soccer has taught me how to work as part of a team and how to deal with the ups and downs of life."

Musa knows a thing or two about life's challenges: he is an amputee, having lost a leg at seven years old when a bomb blew up in front of him in Congo, where he is from. Wearing a prosthetic, he has continued his passion for soccer. It hasn't been easy, he noted, explaining that he had to learn to walk and run all over again.

But his efforts have paid off: he was recently selected to play for the US National Amputee Soccer Team!

"Musa truly has a gift as a soccer player," Tillie's Touch Coach Dale Johnson said. "His determination is just incredible. I really believe this is just a sneak peek... Musa is going to be successful in whatever he decides to do in life because of his grit, determination and hard work."

Corcoran Students Learn Business Firsthand from Cougars Alumni

Corcoran students in Mr. Schroth's Business Math class had an opportunity to learn about their curriculum firsthand, thanks to a virtual visit from Corcoran alumni – and now successful business owners – Bianca Jones and Cordell Grant.

Bianca, a 2008 Corcoran graduate and Cordell, a 2009 Corcoran graduate, are co-owners of BOSSMADE, an apparel company that they started in 2015. They took the time to join the Business Math class for their final unit, entrepreneurship, to talk about their journeys from the Home of the Cougars to business owners.

During the discussion, students asked their predecessors about the challenges



of starting their own business, how they got the business up and running financially, how they came up with their business plan and logo, how they built the business to success, the company's future, how they stay motivated and more.

Mr. Schroth said the experience was invaluable for his students, as it helped bring what they have been learning to life. "Hearing about these concepts from a former Corcoran Cougar and someone that has followed a path to graduation like all this year's soon-to-be alumni not only makes the idea of becoming a business owner more appealing, but it also makes it a true reality for them," Mr. Schroth explained.

Junior **Emani Smith**, who hopes to start her own business one day, said she was inspired to continue pursuing her dreams – but she also learned about the importance of perseverance.

"I learned that business is not a piece of cake," she explained. "It takes time, dedication, and hard work. There are pros and cons to starting your own business. I feel like the information and advice I was given will really assist me in the future."

LeMoyne/ Montessori Students to Welcome School's First Therapy Dog

Thanks to a grant from the SCSD Educational Foundation, the 2021-22 school year will bring at least one new member to the **LeMoyne Elementary** community: a therapy dog!

ENL teacher **Michaela Clark** came up with the idea several years ago and has been working to help the pieces come together.



"The idea driving this project is that students must have their social and emotional needs met before we can expect them to not just succeed but to excel," Ms. Clark explained. "Our team will utilize this program to assist students who have social, emotional, or communication goals that are impeding their success."

To prepare for the full-time therapy dog's arrival next school year, students have been researching the different types of working dogs and creating presentations to share with the school community about the project.

"We learned that therapy dogs can help people believe in themselves," first grade student **Sheysa Valdivia** said. "They can make us feel safe and warm at school."

Ed Smith Student Donates Mental Health Care Packages

Thanks to the kindness of **Ed Smith** 7th grader **Ruby Gozan-Keck**, 200 students at Ed Smith, Lincoln and Henninger received mental health care packages.

As part of her Tikkun Olam (healing or repairing the world) project before her bat mitzvah, she chose to lead a project focusing on mental health in kids and teens. She interviewed **Dr. Althea Henry**, the psychologist at Lincoln Middle School, seeking advice for youngsters who are struggling or feeling alone, especially during COVID-19. Based on what she learned, she created a website to raise awareness and share resources where youngsters can seek help. Then, she

created 200 'fidget bags,' a small gift for students who may be struggling. The bags each included stress balls and other small tokens, as well as an individualized note of encouragement. She delivered them to Ed Smith, Lincoln and Henninger to be distributed as needed.

Third grade students at **STEAM at Dr. King** recently learned about child activists, as part of an ELA lesson.

Students researched the child activist that made the biggest impact on them and then made posters highlighting the activist's impact.



"This was a phenomenal experience for the students," teacher **Cynthia Pace** explained. "A lot of the child activists we learned about were discovering their interests and that civic ability when they were 9 and 10 years old. Our kids are in third grade – they are that age and they have learned that they can make a difference. They learned that doing something large is possible when you are working for a cause."

Seymour Students Experience College Life at Annual SU 'Shadow Day'

Fifth grade students from **Seymour** became #SCSDCollegeReady during the school's annual 'Shadow Day' at Syracuse University – held virtually this year. Students enjoyed a virtual tour of the SU campus, receiving a welcome message from Vice Chancellor Haynie, a presentation from an admissions counselor and discussion with current college students.



Students Showcase Their NASA STEM Products and STEM Challenges What's the best design for a parachute to land a spacecraft on Mars?

Three fifth graders from **Roberts** – **Aubrey Haggerty, Essence Fry** and **Avery Sauer** – have some ideas. Through the U.S. Department of Education's Nita M. Lowey 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC) Grant Program, and in collaboration with NASA scientists and engineers, the students chose to answer this question by using the engineering design process.

As part of their 'Mission to Mars' challenge, their objective was to create a drag device. Because spacecrafts travel at extremely high speeds, they need

some sort of drag device to slow them down to prevent them from crashing into the planet and becoming damaged. The students were tasked with working within the limits



(or constraints) of mass and weight to successfully accomplish their mission. At the end of their research, they were selected as one of just two groups in the state to present their findings virtually!

"I like space and robots and building stuff, so I wanted to do something like this," Avery said. "It took us a while – we had to research and experiment and figure out what materials would be best for us to use. We had to get the perfect sizing for both the parachute and the strings. I got annoyed a lot

because I don't have a lot of patience, but this really helped me get better at being patient. I also learned to speak up instead of just using my voice quietly!"
