### SCSD Students Learn Life Skills & Career Readiness through Skills Win! Program

"We'd like to open an event planning and catering company that primarily hires low income or homeless people," the PSLA sophomores shared. "Our business would benefit the Syracuse community while also serving as a source of income for those who need it."

It was their final meeting, and **PSLA at Fowler** sophomores were presenting their business pitches to investors.

The 'businesses' were hypothetical ideas developed through group brainstorming over the course of just half an hour, and the 'investors' were two Syracuse University student volunteers.

Through the Skills Win! program, high school students at PSLA at Fowler and **ITC** received weekly lessons in people skills, time management, life skills, budgeting, business, and more. The program, developed from Professor Bill Coplin's book, '10 Things Employers Want You to Learn in College,' is led by Syracuse University student volunteers.

"We've learned life skills," PSLA sophomore **Ella Foresti** shared. "We've planned out our week to help us stay organized. We've practiced interview skills. These are very important life skills that everyone should know! The budgeting was helpful, because now I can save for college or for a house, instead of blowing my money when I get a job! Whatever I end up doing, these things will help me."

"They've talked to us about very practical, real-life situations," PSLA sophomore **Jayda Southworth** added. "They've gone over how to make a resume and what it takes to get a job – what we can say in an interview. These are things that we don't always learn in school, but they are a real necessity for life. I've always been stressed about interviews, but they have helped me rehearse what to say and what to put on my resume, and I absolutely feel more confident in myself now."

In addition to the school-based curriculum, this year, for the first time. SCSD middle school students were also introduced to the Skills Win! curriculum. thanks to the Syracuse Police Department's PAL program. Over the course of a month, sixth through eighth grade students from Clary, Ed Smith, ELMS, Grant, Huntington, Roberts, Salem Hyde, Syracuse Latin, and Syracuse STEM at Blodgett participated in a Skills Win! Tournament for Youth evening coaching sessions to help them learn these same valuable skills. In partnership with the Syracuse University Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, students learned skills to enhance their personal and professional success, including time management, study skills, typing skills, and more.

April Arnzen, Micron Senior Vice President and Chief People Officer, and President of the Micron Foundation, recently gave opening remarks to 60 young women from Ed Smith, ELMS, Lincoln, and Syracuse STEM at Blodgett.

At Girls Going Tech Espanol, an event organized by OCC and La Liga and sponsored by Micron, the native Spanish speakers in a day of hands-on STEM learning and mentorship, all in Spanish.

"I'm excited to be here so I can see what kinds of jobs I can get when I graduate," Syracuse STEM at Blodgett 8th grader Lillian Estrada said. "I'm interested in Science – it can tell you a lot about the Earth and how things are made. Being here around so many Spanish speakers makes me feel comfortable. It makes me more interested in what they have to say because I can understand them so well."

Following the hands-on activities, where students built "wiggle bots" and created binary bracelets, they broke into small groups and had mentoring sessions with women working in Architecture & Interior Design, Construction Project Management, Digital Accessibility, Semiconductor Industry Operations, Micron's Expansion Team, Engineering and Aerospace, Renewable Energy, Emergency Medical Technology, and more.

Micron, IST/Schneider Packaging, SRC, the MOST, and MACNY were all on hand at an Advance Manufacturing/ Innovation Fair at the JMA Wireless Dome recently - an event organized by the SCSD Career and Technical Education Department, Department of Science and Technology, and STEAM School. Students from **Brighton** Academy, Clary, Ed Smith, Oasis Academy, ELMS, Frazer, Grant, Huntington, HW Smith, Lincoln, Roberts, Syracuse Latin, and Syracuse STEM at Blodgett all attended.

The students rotated through stations in the Dome, participating in handson learning and asking questions of professionals working in STEM and manufacturing fields.

Students used a remote to operate a Fanuc ER-4 robot arm; collaborated in a manufacturing effectiveness challenge to see who could create the most functioning pens in three minutes; practiced operating a drone; and more.

"This was interesting," Lincoln 7th grader Savannah Murray said as she walked between one station and the next. "I've learned more about how things are built and how companies work!"

"For me, the best part has been the college visits," Sadia Uwase shared. "These experiences give us choices. We're juniors and we need that experience. These have been my first experiences on college campuses!"

"It's been fun to make new things and help others," 6th grade student **Yanelis** Natos explained. "My favorite part of the lunch group has been learning to cook - I've even learned how to use my senses to improve cooking by adding spices. We've made smoothies, bagel pizza, empanadas, and more. We have also talked about how much food ingredients cost, and how much more it can cost to eat at a restaurant. You can save a lot of money by cooking yourself, and I know how to cook at home now. These are good skills to have."

## **Diversity, Equity & Belonging** SCSD Schools Focus on Celebrating Diversity, Creating Equity, and Ensuring a Sense of Belonging for Students





#### You belong here.

It's the message that each SCSD school building wants students to hear and feel.

It's also the mission of the SCSD Office of Diversity, Equity, and Belonging -DEB. The office, led by Director **Dr**. Reba Hodge, also includes Assistant Directors Sophia Burden and Jasmine Price. Together, their mission is to build, support, and sustain communities of belonging in SCSD schools, departments, and offices through efforts, policies, and practices that drive diversity, elevate equity, and build belonging.

To help ensure that DEB initiatives are spreading quickly and effectively throughout the district, this year, each building has been equipped with a DEB Lead. This staff member has been tasked with attending DEB trainings, brainstorming with the school's Equity Leadership Team, and working alongside staff and students to implement DEB programs and initiatives and address inequities when - and even before - they arise.

The DEB Lead's role also includes developing an equity goal specific to their school building that can be tied to tangible results. These equity goals are intended to allow staff to analyze their

specific student population to ensure that they are meeting their students' specific needs.

So what do DEB initiatives look like within SCSD schools?

STEAM at Dr. King DEB Lead Ashley Burke came up with the idea for a gender-neutral bathroom after attending a Supporting LGBTQIA+ training.

One of the practical ways that DEB practices have been implemented in school buildings this year is through placing a focused priority on incorporating student voice.

At Brighton Academy, staff plan to implement a schoolwide survey to gauge students' feelings of belonging. Their goal is to enact initiatives throughout the school year that will lead to an end-of-vear survey response showing that at least 75% of students indicate feeling that they belong in school.

"In order for our engine to drive, we have to have the people who are leading understand our students' needs," Ms. **Hobbs** shared. "We can't come up with that ourselves – that's why we need student input. We want to hear what students feel like they're missing



at school. What makes them feel like they don't belong? Our demographic is mostly black and brown students. The system was not designed for students like ours. We need to be the whistleblowers."

At Syracuse Latin, staff plan to begin including students in their analysis of the school's annual climate survey data.

At Dr. Weeks, the school's equity goal is for staff to be mindful of how they speak to and speak about their students and families. This means being cognizant of a student or family's cultural background – which prompted DEB Lead Madison Korytkowski to initiate the 'I Know My Full Name' project last school year and continue it again this year.

"It's a way for their voices to be uplifted," Ms. Korytkowski shared. "What they have to say is really important, and we want to stop and celebrate them for who they are. This project has helped students realize that they are appreciated for who they are - their whole identity."

In an effort to celebrate all students and their unique backgrounds, Syracuse **STEM at Blodgett** is incorporating weekly 'Inclusion Monday' activities this year. In the school's twice-daily CREW meetings, students talk about diversity and how they can provide inclusion in their building. The school is also starting three new affinity groups for students who may have felt underrepresented before: an American Sign Language Club, a Latine Student Union, and a group for indigenous students, led by the school's first indigenous teacher.

### Important Say Yes Reminders for Seniors:

Students applying for early action or early decision will need to submit their college applications on or around **November 1**, depending on the school. Regular decision applications are generally due by **January 1**. Deadlines vary by school, so be sure to check dates for every college you are applying to.

All students seeking a Say Yes Scholarship must apply for Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and New York State Tuition Assistance Program (TAP). We highly recommend that you complete both applications prior to submitting your Say Yes Syracuse application, which is due by **July 1**.
